This is a breathtaking depiction of an autistic boy's struggles and a story for anyone who has ever worried about fitting in.] Registration is required.

ADULT PROGRAMS

The Conservation Movement in Connecticut – Monday, March 22nd, 6:30-8:00 PM

This month, I would like to highlight some new features on our web page that our patrons will find useful.

First, for our teens, there is now a designated **Teen Databases page** for middle and high school students. This page spotlights library databases that teens are most likely to need. For example, our History Resource Center includes reference entries, newspaper articles, and primary documents for a wide variety of historical events studied in 7th through 12th grades. The Teen Databases page also has a literary database, a Biography Resource Center with extensive entries, and a Science Resource Center for those working on science fair projects or daily science homework.

For teens approaching SAT testing, there is **PrepMe**, a service that offers free SAT study assistance. Students create their own account using their library card barcode. The system then prompts them to take a diagnostic test and select the date they are taking the exam. Once this information is in the system, the service creates a personalized schedule which includes lessons, quizzes, and practice tests. Scores and feedback are sent regularly via e-mail. This is a great way to prepare for the SATs and it is absolutely FREE to our Monroe patrons.

There has also been a timely addition to the homepage for our adult patrons. With unemployment still a serious concern in the community, the library has taken advantage of an opportunity to provide a new live online job assistance service called **JobNow!** Through JobNow! patrons can use their library card to create a free personal account that allows them to submit résumés for professional critique. Live online job coaches are available to chat Monday through Sunday from 3:00 to 11:00 p.m. to provide interview practice or assistance with other job related questions and skills. If you are looking for a job, be sure to look at all the different types of assistance offered through JobNow!

The library pays for all of these quality databases and online services so our patrons can get reliable information free of charge both in the library and at home. If you're not already taking advantage of them, be sure to try them out!

Mural Repairs

Many of you have had occasion to stop and admire the wonderful mural, "Our Town," in the library. You may have noticed cracks have developed, probably as a result of the building settling. These cracks are being fixed with the help of the mural's creator, David Merrill, and carpenter Mike Neiman. Mike filled the two bigger cracks with caulking, then covered them with fiberglass mesh to hold both sides together and covered it with a compound. David has completed repainting the parts of the mural that showed damage to the left of the doorway to the Children's Department.

"Time will tell whether the caulking and fiberglass method will stand up to the stresses of the location", Merrill said. "By next winter we'll know whether it's going to hold or not."

The Monroe Historical Society raised the more than \$2,000 needed to complete the initial test phase of this lengthy project. Repairs were covered by a variety of donations, including \$1,000 from the Newtown Savings Bank, \$1,000 from the Edith Wheeler Memorial Trust, Friends of the Library gave \$300, and members of the Historical Society and library patrons donated to the project.

The Monroe Historical Society was incorporated in 1959 and recently celebrated its 50th year serving the town of Monroe. Below is a timeline of events that have occurred in town over the last fifty years.

- 1959** Monroe Historical Society was founded. The first president was Fred Gregory. Current board members Edward Coffey and Philip Jones were among the founding members.
The first bank in Monroe opened at Stepney Green.
YMCA organized in Monroe
- 1960** The Monroe Historical Society sent out a press release looking for old Monroe photographs. We now have over 2,000 photos in our collection at the Edith Wheeler Memorial Library in the history room.
- 1962** Stepney School opened in February.
St. Stephen's School opened (now known as St Jude School).
The Monroe Courier began publishing.
- 1964** Ed Coffey chairs the Society's first house tour in town.
- 1966** Kindergarten was initiated in the Monroe Public Schools.
- 1969** Chalk Hill Middle School opened.
Monroe Center Historic District was established.
- 1972** Monroe Town Hall, Library and Police Headquarters Complex was dedicated.
Webb Mountain Park opened.
- 1973** Monroe Sesquicentennial year. Monroe planned the biggest Memorial Day Parade ever in celebration of its 150th year under the leadership of chairman, Bob Tranzillo.
William E. Wolfe Park dedicated.
Barn Hill- East Village 1790 Schoolhouse was given to the Society by the members of the Methodist Church.
- 1976** Monroe celebrates the nation's Bicentennial. Monroe Historical Society sponsored the Bicentennial history quilt – now located in the Monroe History Room at the Edith Wheeler Memorial Library.
- 1980s** Monroe Historical Society restored the 1811 East Village Methodist Meetinghouse at the corner of East Village and Barn Hill Roads (also a gift of the Monroe Methodist Church).
Monroe Elementary School fire in August, 1982 – rebuilt by 1983 school year.
- 1985** Nancy Zorena, Judy Standerford and Joan Sondergaard organize their first summer Hands-on-History for children at the schoolhouse. It has been held each summer for the last 24 years.
- 1993** Monroe Historical Society sold the Bailey House on Old Tannery Road in order to purchase the Eliot Beardsley Homestead at 31 Great Ring Road from the town of Monroe.

Ongoing The Society is working to maintain and restore the Eliot Beardsley House with its Hands-on-History programs, tag, textile and Christmas sales as well as through membership contributions, and grants.
